Iowa. She began her career in 1986 in the Turbomachinery Branch and held various leadership roles in propulsion at MSFC, including Director of the Propulsion Systems Department, immediately prior to her role in the Engineering Directorate.

ROCKET PARK RENOVATIONS AT USSRC

The USSRC Rocket Park renovations are scheduled to begin in November of 2022 and to be completed by September of 2023. The rockets were removed for renovation in October of 2018, due to deterioration. The US Space and Rocket Center has done some master planning for the facility's future, and the decision was made to update Rocket Park with a green space that will house the refurbished historic rockets, the Space Launch System Pathfinder engine section, and an outdoor classroom amphitheater. The current lunar crater will be updated to reflect future lunar missions and new outdoor simulations and play areas.

The restoration will be done in phases over the next few years, and the total project estimate is \$10.2 million. All the rockets have been fully restored and are in the warehouse ready to be installed. The landscaping and civil work will be implemented before the refurbished rockets will be mounted.

MRA member Brooks Moore worked closely with USSRC to ensure the rockets would be reinstalled in proper order to tell the story of the US Space Program from its military phases leading up to NASA, including Army Redstone, Jupiter, Jupiter C, Juno II, Mercury Redstone and Saturn IB. MRA has also partnered with USSRC to build a memorial to the space explorers in Huntsville adjacent to the restored Rocket Park. (Information on the following page.)

UPDATE ON THE SPACE EXPLORATION MEMORIAL AND THE SPACE EXPLORERS HONOR ROLL

Almost four years ago in the fall of 2018, a group of MRA employees came together to talk about how we might create a living memorial that would capture the stories of the incredible adventure of space exploration that has taken place in Huntsville over the past seven decades.

The world-class status of our Huntsville icon, the Saturn V, stands beside I-565 for all visitors and residents to see. The size of the rocket combined with the more than 100,000 people who built it over a period of almost a decade dwarfs any other city icon in the world. The iconic Eiffel tower was built by 500 men over a period of 2 years, and it was never launched into orbit!! What has been done in Huntsville in space exploration has been an incredible world class accomplishment!

Recognizing this reality and remembering the privilege that we all have had in being part of this journey to space, the MRA set out to create a living space exploration memorial with accompanying honor roll of people and stories—not just the leaders, but all of the people; "the wind beneath our wings!" Now we are approaching the time of the realization of this goal and challenge, the construction of the memorial in the Rocket Park of the United States Space and Rocket Center amidst the machines of space that all of us together have built. This living memorial will be built as it should be, in partnership with the USSRC which has redesigned the Rocket Park and is returning the refurbished original rockets to once again show the technological chronology of the human exploration of space.

The Space Exploration living memorial wall and database will be paid for by the people who built the machines and will stand among them to connect the people with their space vehicles. All of the names of the past and present MSFC employees will be engraved on the memorial wall and their stories will be placed in the honor roll database along with the names and stories of contractor employees who worked with MSFC. In total, the memorial's goal will be to bring together all of the Space Explorers Huntsville, thereby capturing the stories and recognizing the contributions of everyone.

We, MRA, are within two months of needing to accumulate the \$750,000 that will be used to do the construction of the memorial in the Rocket Park in partnership with the USSRC.


