DAY OF REMEMBRANCE



Marshall employees gathered January 26 to honor the astronaut crews and others who lost their lives while furthering the goals of human spaceflight. Marshall Director Jody Singer (right) was joined by Mike Hopkins, commander of the second crewed flight of NASA’s SpaceX Crew Dragon in 2021, to offer remarks and lead a candle-lighting ceremony in memory of the crews of Apollo 1 and space shuttles Challenger and Columbia. “They were our colleagues, they were our friends, and more – they were part of our family,” Singer said.

She noted the risks always inherent in space exploration, echoing earlier remarks by NASA Administrator Bill Nelson. “But with this risk comes the responsibility not just to learn from what we do, but to honor those we have lost,” Singer told those in attendance in Building 4221. “We remind ourselves what it really means to be in this business, where we do the impossible. We must ask the questions, we must speak up, and we must remain vigilant about our astronauts’ safety and the safety of our workforce.” **(Article courtesy NASA Marshall Star)**

SPACE EXPLORATION MEMORIAL UPDATE

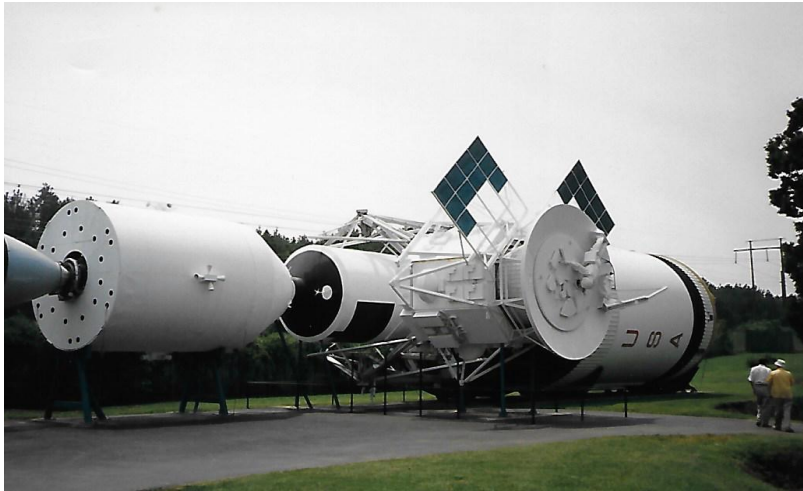


The Space Exploration memorial team of MRA has made great progress toward realizing the creation of the memorial. At this point, we have raised \$824,000 (including pledges) which is a little more than the target we set for ourselves based on the estimated cost that was designed by Matheny Goldman Architects. The Space and Rocket Center has chosen a contractor, Miller and Miller, to carry out the transformation and upgrading of the Rocket Park, including the Memorial.

This transformation will include building the Space Exploration Memorial with its accompanying Space Explorers Honor Roll (database) which is online and accessible from a kiosk at the memorial location. That kiosk will also contain information about the location of the different space explorers' names on the memorial wall. MRA is partnering with the USSRC and is participating in the discussions of the details of the bid, looking at trade-off's and options to bring the construction goals together with the available funds.

The MRA portion of the discussions is proceeding well, and we are addressing the approach and costs. This stage of the process should be completed in the next several weeks with a goal of having the contractor in place in March. We will continue to seek additional funding and to continue adding information to the Space Explorers Honor Roll. We ask all of the MRA members as well as other retired and active MSFC employees to put their information into the Honor Roll database and to make a donation to the memorial if you have not done so. We are proud to report that MRA donations have totaled more than \$200,000 with individual gifts ranging from \$50 to \$25,000. The past Center Directors and their families have given more than \$75,000 including \$5,150 from Dr. von Braun's family in honor of their father and the entire Apollo team. 50th ANNIVERSARY OF SKYLAB



It has been half a century since the Skylab missions, and the Space & Rocket Center is planning a 50th Anniversary Celebration to be held in the Fall of 2023. As many of our MRA members were involved in the MSFC-managed Skylab program, we have an opportunity to participate in the celebration event.

An effort has begun to locate and refurbish all the Skylab artifacts housed at the USSRC. There are plans to once again outfit the Skylab Orbital Workshop (OWS) mockup, the original flight item being a MSFC/McDonnell-Douglas-provided Saturn V third stage rocket segment. Additionally, the Skylab neutral buoyancy mockup, the only complete item representing the flown Skylab vehicle, will be refurbished. Further, there are plans to retrieve the one-G mockups of the Multiple Docking Adapter (MDA), the Airlock Module (AL), and the Apollo Telescope Mount (ATM) from the USSRC “boneyard” to also be refurbished and displayed.

BOB STEWART Inducted into Wall of Heroes



During Veterans Week in November 2022, Retired Brig. Gen. Robert Stewart was inducted into the

Madison County Hall of Heroes. His resume includes, Army aviator, Instructor Pilot, Test Pilot, and he was the first active Army Officer to be selected as a NASA astronaut. He received three combat awards, including the Distinguished Flying Cross and two purple Hearts for wounds received from enemy action. Bob became an astronaut in 1979 and was a mission specialist on STS-41-B in 1984 and STS-51-J in 1985, logging 289 hours in space and 12 hours of EVA operations. In retirement, he is a docent at USSRC and a member of MRA.
