# PARTNERSHIPS BETWEEN MRA AND USSRC

The Alabama Space Science Exhibit Commission announced the appointment of Dr. Kimberly Robinson as Executive Director and CEO of the U. S. Space & Rocket Center recently.

As a 31-year veteran of NASA, Dr. Robinson's background includes leadership, public engagement, engineering, education, flight crew training and hands-on experience shaping the nation's space program. Previous positions include serving as NASA's Utilization Manager for Advanced Exploration Systems, and previously the Payload Mission Manager for Artemis 1, the first integrated flight test of NASA's Orion spacecraft, the Space Launch Systems (SLS) rocket and the Exploration Ground Systems at KSC.

Before that, she served as the SLS Strategic Communications Manager, sharing the future of human space exploration with the public. She is the recipient of numerous NASA performance awards, including an Exceptional Achievement Medal and a Silver Snoopy. She completed her Ph.D and master's degrees in Engineering Management and Systems Engineering at UAH and her Bachelor of Engineering in Mechanical Engineering from Vanderbilt University.

Dr. Robinson is married to Keith Robinson and has three sons. She is an avid community volunteer and serves as Vice President for A New Leash on Life, an animal rescue organization and has taught at Oakwood University and UAH.

## Highlights of Continuing Progress on the Space Exploration Memorial (by Rick Chappell)

Despite the limitations in personal contact caused by the pandemic, MRA activities on the creation of the space exploration memorial have continued on several fronts: the online database of names and biographies, partnership interactions with the U.S. Space & Rocket Center, evolution of the phased memorial design, and fundraising from individuals and companies.

The online database lists the names of more than 21,000 present and former NASA/MSFC employees. The creation of this database was chaired by Sandra Turner and Gray Settle and other volunteers. We lost Sandra in February, and we are dedicating this unique historical database to her memory. Gray Settle, who has done all of the software work on the database, has agreed to become the Chair of the Memorial History Committee. Thanks to Sandra, Gray and the volunteers. No other part of NASA has done this, and it is appropriate that Marshall and its retirees have been the first to create this incredible look at humankind's most significant exploration through this database.

Now we need everyone to take a few minutes, go online to www.marshallretirees.org and add your biographical and career information and a picture for yourself or your family members if they have passed on. Also, please make a contribution to the Space Exploration Memorial in remembrance and honor of people whom you had the privilege of working with. To put this into perspective, suppose you were one of the 100 crewmembers of Columbus' first voyage. The only names we now remember from that voyage are Columbus, Ferdinand and Isabella. We do not know or remember the names of the crewmembers, many of whom were left to establish an outpost in Hispaniola because of the sinking of the Santa Maria on a reef during their visit. These people all died on Hispaniola, and we do not know their names. Now suppose you were one of the crewmembers and when you finally returned to Spain after an incredible journey, you were asked to give your name and experience to a person representing Spain so that you and your family could be remembered. But you did not do it, because you had other more important things to do. Now with America's and humankind's most incredibly journey of traveling and living in space, do you have time to add your story to the database? Is it important enough for you and the family who supported you to be acknowledged and remembered?

## Highlights of Continuing Progress on the Space Exploration Memorial (Continued)

The MRA has had a positive and increasing partnership with the U.S. Space & Rocket Center (USSRC) regarding the creation of the memorial concept and the evolution of how it can be constructed and where it should be located. The donations that are made through the MRA website go to the 501c3, USSRC Education Foundation website and are held in a restricted fund for the Space Exploration Memorial. Our partnership with the USSRC has been important and mutually supported and will add to the bridge between our two organizations that began with our building the rockets and spacecraft that became the foundation of the USSRC and continued with the USSRC becoming the visitor center for MSFC and then with the docents program to which so many of you have contributed your time to make successful. MRA wants to expand this bridge in a way that more firmly and meaningfully connects the present and former employees and families to the place which displays the rockets and spacecraft that they have built and operated for America. The Space Exploration Memorial is one of the important elements of this bridge, tying the space explorers and their families to that place that shows their accomplishments—a place where their lives can be remembered and celebrated forever.

The memorial has been conceptually designed in phases so that it can be constructed as the funding is received. The initial phase has now been put in place, the online database which can be set up to be accessed by the public and by the space explorer's families at the USSRC. The location of the memorial and the initial kiosk are being discussed now. We have contracted with a very innovative company in Atlanta which is creating an animation of the memorial in the context of the USSRC campus, and MRA will use this animation to assist with public awareness and fundraising.

Because of the pandemic, fundraising has been affected, particularly with the companies because of the social distancing considerations. We are now entering a phase where these personal interactions can be more aggressively pursued. This has begun with discussions with one of the very large aerospace companies. Individual personal contributions have more than doubled since our last report and are at \$70,000 with the range of individual gifts from \$50 to \$25,000. Our own Wernher von Braun in a personal memo to President John F. Kennedy in 1961, listed the options that he foresaw for the US space program that could put us ahead of the Russians. The moon program was his recommendation and President Kennedy agreed, and we did it! That program created the incredible technology that has kept America in the leading role in space exploration from then to now. Let's not miss our opportunity to remember and honor all of our colleagues who have made space exploration and living in space possible, just as President Kennedy did not miss his opportunity to challenge America to the greatness that Marshall and its partnering companies have made possible.
