SPACE EXPLORATION MEMORIAL

NOTE: PLEASE READ THIS ARTICLE VERY CLOSELY AS IT CONTAINS IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT THE SPACE EXPLORATION MEMORIAL AND ITS FUTURE

Beginning in 2018, a group of MRA members had a vision to create a Space Exploration Memorial, containing the names of past and present MSFC employees, that would be located at the USSRC amidst the rockets that have made the space journey possible. A plan was put in place to design and raise funds for a memorial. As we all know, the pandemic had a tremendous impact on any fundraising activities.

During this time, we continued to give updates in the MRA newsletters and solicited donations from our members, as well as solicited funds from outside sources.

As of today, we are reached a defining moment! Through the support of Dr. Kimberly Robinson, USSRC CEO and MRA member, a beautiful concept for the Memorial based on coordinated inputs from the USSRC and MRA has been created by local architects Matheny and Goldman. SPACE EXPLORATION MEMORIAL (Continued)

So far, donations from individuals range from \$50 to \$25,000 and total more than \$110,000. Contributions from the County Commission and other organizations total \$60,000, with a pledge from the City of Huntsville of \$200,000 over four years and indications of support from the state and other organizations of \$10's of 1,000's. These gifts and pledges total about \$400,000. To create the Memorial wall and plaza will require \$750,000. As of today, we only had 65 MRA members of our 180 members who have contributed.

The contractor will be selected by the USSRC this August to do the Rocket Park transformation which will be carried out over the following year. The MRA Space Exploration Memorial will be part of that construction if we raise the \$350,000 balance that we need between now and end of August 2022.

Dr. Helen Cole is a Project Manager within the Science, Research and Projects Division of the Science and Technology Directorate at MSFC. From 2007-2015, Dr. Cole served as

Project Manager of James Webb Space Telescope (JWST) activities, which included optical verification testing of all 18 Primary Mirror segments, cryogenic testing of the JWST flight Primary Mirror Backplane Structure and testing of significant optical ground systems used for integration by GSFC. She also served as a liaison to GSFC JWST Sunshield management as a NASA rep at NeXolve LLC. in Huntsville, during JWST sunshield membrane layer fabrication and testing.



Mr. Jim Moore is the President and CEO of NeXolve in Huntsville. He

has 33 years' experience in design and analysis of advanced aerospace hardware. He served as Program Manager on NeXolve's subcontract to design, manufacture and test the James Webb Space Telescope Sun Shield Membrane Sub-System. He has authored and co-authored 34 technical papers and a chapter in the AIAA Gossamer Spacecraft Design Textbook.

BOOK REVIEW by Jay Foster

THE SECRET G.I. SCIENTISTS OF REDSTONE ARSENAL Author: Ernest Pierce

Dr. von Braun and his team arrived at Redstone Arsenal from Ft. Bliss in 1950, and the Army wanted the Team to hit the ground running. Therefore, the Army provided 150 draftee scientists (really engineers), from all engineering disciplines and from all over the United States. Some members of this group included Jim Kingsbury and Bob Lindstrom, along with Carl Bergstrom, John Aberg, Clarence Fulmer, Charles Hilderbrand, and Eugene McKannan.

Redstone Arsenal was completely shut down when the von Braun team and the GI engineers arrived. This led to some interesting assignments. One buck private engineer was assigned to be the Facility Manager of all 112 square miles of Redstone Arsenal. Later, in 1953 the Army sent another 150 young draftee engineers to join the von Braun Team, and in 1955 the Army sent a third and last group of 150 young draftee engineers to join the von Braun team. I, Jay Foster, was a member of the third and last group.

One of the members of the first group, Ernest Pierce, decided to write about his experiences after he returned home from this enlistment. He wrote a small book entitled the same as this article. Ernest Pierce gave a copy to Norman Shapiro, who worked with him during his GI years and Norman gave the book to me. Jean Lee has checked with the UAH Special Collections Department and they do have a copy in the NASA archives. Jean will hold my copy as part of MRA archives, if you would like to read it.

I thought things were strange that I was 24 and in Basic Training with eighteen- year olds. The Korean war was over, and yet the Army was still drafting people. This fact led me to speculate on how the Army could guarantee that they could provide 150 engineers at each of the three periods, i.e. 1950, 1953, and 1955. The Army must have had a way to assign quotas to the U.S. States and cities. I believe the "secret" in the book title is the primary reason there is little known about The Secret G. I. Scientists of Redstone Arsenal.
