## Joseph Pelfrey, Director, Marshall Space Flight Center Topic: Marshall's Future

Joseph Pelfrey previously served as deputy center director and was appoint center director in April 2022. Throughout his NASA career, Pelfrey has served in multiple technical leadership positions at Marshall. He began his career as an industry partner, supporting development of space station payload hardware, and joined Marshall full-time in 2004 as an aerospace engineer in the Science and Mission Systems Office. He went on to serve in various leadership roles within NASA's International Space Station Program. In 2008, Pelfrey joined Marshall's Engineering Directorate as the design integration lead for the Ares I Upper Stage. In 2011, he was named engineering task manager for SLS' Spacecraft/Payload Integration and Evolution Office and, subsequently, manager of the Commercial Orbital Transportation Services Project. In 2012, Pelfrey was named deputy manager and then manager of the Exploration and Space Transportation Development Office. In 2016, he was appointed associate director for operations in Marshall's Engineering Directorate. Pelfrey served as deputy manager and manager of Human Exploration Development and Operations Office from 2020 to 2022, overseeing the management and implementation of Marshall's work in the areas of human exploration and transportation projects, habitation systems, payload and mission operations and integration; and International Space Station payload, facility, environmental control and life support systems project development and integration.

A native of Cheraw, South Carolina, Pelfrey received a bachelor's degree in aerospace engineering from Auburn University in 2000. He resides in Huntsville with his family.

#### **INCREASE IN 2024 MEMBERSHIP DUES**

While membership dues have remained constant for many years, and with the increase in administrative costs of newsletter printing and mailings, guest speakers' meals and honorariums, and technical support to the MRA website and honor roll, the Board has reviewed the dues. In addition, while MRA is supporting a UAH Endowed Scholarship, the Scholarship Committee is exploring opportunities to expand scholarships to USSRC Space Camps, Alabama A&M, Drake State, and others. A portion of the additional dues will allow MRA to play a role in funding scholarships to promote space careers for young deserving students. **The Board voted to raise the dues to \$50 per year beginning January 1, 2024.**

New retirees are automatically offered a free membership for the remainder of the year in which they retire. If retirement occurs after the first day of September, membership will be free for the remainder of the current year and for the entire upcoming year. ### **Space Exploration Memorial Update**



Work is continuing at the Rocket Park at the USSRC. Many of the artistic walls have been poured and the newly refurbished rockets are being mounted on pedestals throughout the park in chronological order.

Construction of the Space Exploration Wall of Honor is scheduled to begin the week of May 13<sup>th</sup> with a construction time of two to three weeks. The detailed design of the 20 engraved panels which will go on the wall has been completed. The Kiosk, which will be located in front of the wall, has been purchased and has a touchscreen with the names and their location on the wall. The bio's of these employees will be available online at the kiosk so that the family can transfer the story to their cell phone as they enjoy locating the name. The dedication is anticipated to be later in the summer or early fall. MRA has raised almost \$1M to create the memorial. Donations may be made online on the MRA website to complete funding. After almost five years, it is very exciting to reach this point in the project.

#### MRA MOURNS THE LOSS OF BROOKS MOORE



MRA loss a special member with the passing of Brooks Moore. He served as President of the Association, as well as a long-standing Board Member. He played an important role in achieving the goal of establishing a Space Exploration Memorial at USSRC.

Colleagues and friends share their thoughts and memories of Brooks:

The space exploration community lost an incredible leader on April 9, 2024 when Brooks Moore passed on to the heavens that he had been so fundamentally involved in exploring. To know Brooks was to know and experience the full history of America's space exploration, beginning with the Wernher von Braun team in the early 1950's. Brooks was an officer in the US Navy during the war and then followed his dreams, graduating from Auburn University in engineering and later joining the von Braun team at Redstone Arsenal in 1952 to work on the challenges of guiding and controlling the flight of the new rockets. He became the Director of Astronics Laboratory (the first American-born laboratory director), during the period in which our nation built the machines to achieve President Kennedy's challenge of putting men on the moon. To be around Brooks was to be around knowledge, both historical and technical and in the company of a friendly, engaging, determined, committed colleague and role model. Brooks was a long -time participant in the NASA Emeritus docent program at USSRC. His, intense knowledge, engaging demeanor captured the attention of visitors as he shared his hands-on knowledge. Recently, Brooks was a trusted advisor to the USSRC in the renovation of the Rocket Park. I was privileged to know him for the past half century.

Brooks was a perfect gentleman. When you went to his office, he would meet you at the door and offer you a seat around his conference table. His office was organized and immaculate. His tone was very pleasant and friendly—until the meeting got under way. Even then, during the most frantic days of Saturn/Apollo, he was never loud, demanding or accusatory. He was very calm and deliberate. He asked probing questions and considered your answers very carefully—sometimes skeptically. He wanted the facts, all the facts and nothing but the facts. Brooks was a technical manager who had the respect of upper management and the many engineers and technicians who worked for him. **Placide Nicaise** 

He was personified by his calm and kind demeanor. Concern for his employees was always uppermost in his mind. People described Brooks as the kindest man they ever knew. He was an excellent listener. When it came to making technical decisions, his personal attributes led, more often than not, to successful conclusions. It was a pleasure to work for him.

#### MRA MOURNS THE LOSS OF JIM SPLAWN



MRA was shocked and saddened over the loss of Jim Splawn. He served as President and long-standing Board Member of MRA and played an important role in the design and capital campaign for the Space Exploration Memorial at the USSRC. He will be missed. Colleagues share memories of Jim:

The career of Jim Splawn is an extraordinary example of the best of NASA, a competent, result-oriented engineer, a professional with a proper respect for nature as we find it yet with a willingness to accept the challenge of modifying whatever seems to constrain us from the future. He was blessed with a winsome personality that supported his sense of leadership and his demonstrated capability to work toward a common goal with people of widely differing personalities and capabilities. This was demonstrated particularly in the development of the neutral buoyancy concept and hardware, a system necessary for the design of Skylab, Space Station, Space Shuttle and space experiments that required human interface. This facility enabled the recovery of Skylab 1 that was badly damaged during launch. Following his highly successful career in the development and utilization of the neutral buoyancy facility, Jim demonstrated uncommon flexibility as the head of the MSFC Resident Management Office at Rocketdyne at a critical point in the design of the Space Shuttle Main engine. Jim Splawn was a true pioneer among other stalwarts of the nation's space program. A true history of MSFC cannot be written without a description of Jim's substantial contributions. In summary, he demonstrated in his every assignment an ability to "get things done".

From a chance NASA Space Shuttle assignment at Rocketdyne in Canoga Park, California, Jim Splawn has been a friend and colleague for the past 50 years. I learned so much about Jim during those three years of daily carpool drives from Camarillo to Canoga Park. Jim was the manager of the neutral buoyancy tanks used at Marshall to train the Skylab astronauts for the successful repair of the first space station. Jim was a man of integrity and would always be there in times of need, both for his family and friends. As a past president of the MRA, Jim spent many hours working to bring about the Space Exploration Memorial now under construction at the USSRC. Jim will always be remembered for his many accomplishments as a NASA manager, a Boeing manager, and his faithful support to his church family. Mission Accomplished Jim!
